That day more than 9,000 Allied Soldiers were killed or wounded, but their sacrifice allowed more than 100,000 Soldiers to begin the slow, hard slog across Europe, to defeat Adolf Hitler's troops.

Holiday City at Berkeley Shareowners Meeting — May 4th, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 1:00pm by President Barbara Egner. This was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance, a prayer that was read by the Secretary Beverly Greco. There was a moment of silence for our men and women in the Armed Services. POOL RULES & REGULATIONS

1) Any person showing evidence of any communicable skin disease, sore or inflamed eyes, cold or nasal or ear discharges, or any other communicable disease shall be denied admission.

2) Any person with excessive sunburn, open blisters, cuts or bandages shall be denied admission.

3) Do not enter the water if you are experiencing or recovering from diarrhea, or have had any signs or symptoms of gastrointestinal (stomach) disease in the past seven days.

4) Diapers/pull ups of any type are not allowed in pool. Adults may not hold children wearing diapers in the pool at anytime.

5) Children should be encouraged to use the restroom before entering the water. Immediately report any "accidents" you observe in the bathing waters to a security guard.

6) No animals, except for service anillals, shall be allowed within the confines of the pool area and within the pool itself.

7) All persons shall shower before entering the pool. Only bathing suits are permitted in the pool. Cut-offs or other substitute swimwear are not allowed.

8) Glass containers of any kind are prohibited within the area of the pool.

9) Conduct, which endangers the safety and comfort of others, shall be prohibited. No running allowed. No ball throwing.

10) Outdoor bathing shall be prohibited during an electrical storm.

11) Persons suspected of being under the influence of drugs or alcohol shall be prohibited from the water and surrounding areas.

12) For general questions go to the main office or see guard on duty.

13) Absolutely no children allowed in pool #1 the age of 16 or under. Proof of age will be required.

14) No tubes or rafts allowed.

15) Definitelyunder no circumstances will childrenbe dropped offunattended at the pool.

16) Be responsible for your grandchildren, Watch them at all times. The badge checker is not a lifeguard.

17) NO DIVING ALLOWED.

18) No hanging on the ropes. If the ropes break the pool will be closed.

19) If you lotion or oil up please shower before going into the pool. If the water in the pool becomes too oily we will have to close and shock the pool and it will be closed until the following day.

20) The only diapers that are allows in the pool are the waterproof swimmie diapers

21) Pool is subject to close on any given day or time at the board's discretion.

22) All residents and guests must sign in.

23) All injuries must be reported to a badge checker for proper documentation

RE: Holiday City at Berkeley Rules and Regulations Pertaining to Water Course Areas

On January 15, 2011, Governor Chris Christie signed three bills into law which were meant to restore and protect the health of the Barnegat Bay and its inhabitants. These bills have set into motion a series of regulations relative to fertilizer usage, standards for stabilizing soil and requirements to maintain and upkeep storm water drains and basins. Some of you may recall that there was a great deal of fanfare relating to the signing of these bills given the decreasing water quality and algae blooms in the Barnegat Bay.

In conjunction with tile New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (hereinafter, "NJDEP") and the Barnegat Bay Partnership (hereinafter "BBP") we have been working to supplement the success of these regulations and implement rules which, through "No Mow Zones" will minimize soil erosion and optimize sediment control, as well as, prevent non-point pollutants and contaminants entering from the common areas of Holiday City Berkeley into the Sunken Branch/Wrangle Brook which ultimately discharge into the Barnegat Bay. These "No Mow Zones" will extent approximately 10 feet to 25 feet from the water's edge.

Although some areas currently contain natural plant buffers, in other spots, native plants have been continuously mowed down and planted with grass. Unfortunately, storm water carrying fertilizer and other forms of non-point pollution such as trash, pesticides and animal waste discharge undesirable elements into our waterways due to the absence of native plants, trees and scrubs.

Consequently Holiday City, in conjunction with NJDEP and BBP, will start to establish plant growth in the "No Mow Buffer Zones" through both the planting of native shrubs and the prohibiting of continued cutting and soil disturbance activities. One major benefit of buffers will be the reduction of geese using the area because geese are much less likely to forage in a planted buffer area.

Please understand, the Board does not want to impede your usage or views of the waterway passing along your yard. We want residents to fully enjoy the waterways. The goal of this initiative is to have healthier, more properly functioning tributaries, which in turn will help protect Barnegat Bay. This effort will initially focus along the Sunken Branch, between Harrington Drive North, Bannier Drive and Jamaica Boulevard. It is the Board's intention to work with every owner in the focus area.

Over the next few months you may see people walking along the streams who are native plant experts, landscapers, NJDEP and BBP employees. They will be planning and planting native plant gardens. The Board is very excited to be part of this project which will benefit both the Holiday City community and the Barnegat Bay. Accordingly, in the immediate future, the Holiday City Board will be passing rules and regulations to implement the project.

In conclusion, EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY, no activity should be undertaken upon Holiday City common area near or contiguous to any of the waterways passing through Holiday City which might impair or inhibit the growth of vegetation in such areas, or, otherwise result in the disturbance of soil in such areas; or, otherwise degrade the water quality and/or contribute to degradation of the water quality of any waterway passing through the Holiday City waterways.

Thank you for your attention and consideration given these matters.
